From the Director

The Wilton Wildlife Preserve & Park is turning ten! In 1996, Saratoga County was auctioning a one-acre parcel on Scout Road in Wilton for back taxes. Wildlife biologists knew the site harbored the state and federally endangered Karner blue butterfly and representatives of The Nature Conservancy approached the Town of Wilton to discuss its willingness to purchase the parcel for protection purposes. Roy McDonald, the Town's supervisor, stated that not only would the Town protect this one parcel, it would work with partners to create a 3,000-acre preserve for the butterfly and a park for people. The partnership between the Town of Wilton, Saratoga County, The Nature Conservancy, and the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation was born. A lot has happened in ten years....

Close to one thousand acres have been protected within the defined Study Area. With the 600 acres of Saratoga County Forestland added, there are 1,570 acres of permanent open space within and immediately adjacent to the Study Area.

Working together, partners and volunteers have restored, are in the process of restoring, or have near-term plans to restore 65 acres of Karner blue butterfly habitat. State and federal grant money has largely supported this effort to recover this beautiful butterfly from the brink of extinction. In the last ten years, two new species have been discovered here; they are the eastern spadefoot toad and the Blanding's turtle. Prior to 2000, the eastern spadefoot toad was unknown inland and north of the Mohawk River. Prior to 2003, the Blanding's turtle's New York range was thought to be Dutchess County and the area bordering the Great Lakes. It's humbling how much we don't know.

With our enthusiastic stalwart volunteers doing the bulk of the work, 12 miles of marked trails have been developed, designated, and maintained for a wide variety of non-motorized uses including hiking, running, snowshoeing, and cross-country skiing. Thanks again to volunteers, the Camp Saratoga and Opdahl Farm trails are known for their superbly groomed trails that provide wonderful opportunities for cross-country skiing and snowshoeing. The Wilton Wildlife Preserve & Park has sponsored scores of free educational programming for families, children, and organizations both at the Preserve & Park and off-site. Our Speakers Series brings in well known experts to share knowledge and skills with avid learners. Recreation events including the annual 5k Fun Run Series and 8k Snowshoe Race draw people from across the region. Our two large annual events, the Open House and Moonlight Ski & Snowshoe, typically attract hundreds of people and introduce or better familiarize them with all that the Wilton Wildlife Preserve & Park offers.

The 1996 partnership fostered this organization, a vibrant entity that board members, volunteers, and financial contributors believe in and support tirelessly. These people have shared in a lot of success. It is my hope and belief that many others will join us in the weeks, months, and years ahead. *Sarah A. Clarkin*

Senator Farley Continues His Support

In 2005, Senator Farley provided a \$4,000 Aid-to-Localities grant to the Wilton Wildlife Preserve & Park. A portion of the money is targeted to the development of an interpretive sign at our Old Gick Farm parcel. A larger portion, \$3,000, was used to purchase 33 pairs of snowshoes. For the near future, these snowshoes will be available at winter education programs for a small rental fee. This award is Senator Farley's fourth consecutive award to the Preserve & Park. We are grateful for his consistent strong support.

There's a New Face at the WWPP

In September of 2005, Gabriel Cahalan started a 10 ½ month internship at the WWPP. While here, Gabe's responsibilities include Karner blue butterfly habitat management planning and implementation, native seed collection, and the development and delivery of educational programming. Gabe also oversees our elementary school outreach effort. Gabe came to WWPP from California where he worked for PRBO Conservation Science identifying birds for point count surveys in the Plumas and Lassen National Forests. He has his Masters in Park and Resource Management and Bachelors in Environmental Studies. He is a great addition!



Land Protection Report

In 2005, over 113 acres were added to the Wilton Wildlife Preserve & Park. In late winter, The Nature Conservancy purchased the 88-acre Fox property. Saratoga County and the Town of Wilton assisted with the purchase via a \$100,000 Open Space Protection grant and a \$25,000 contribution, respectively. The Fox parcel provides habitat and potential habitat for a number of at-risk species whose long-term viabilities depend upon the protection of natural areas exhibiting the typical Saratoga Sandplains community. *See Habitat Restoration and Management* Report. It also expands and extends the recreational possibilities in the Study Area. In conjunction with the Old Gick Farm across the street, the Fox parcel provides a

natural corridor approximating one-third of one mile. This corridor provides passers-by with a sense of what the Preserve & Park has to offer. The Nature Conservancy also protected five small parcels totaling just over 21 acres off of Edie Road in Wilton. Hartwick College owned the property and worked with The Nature Conservancy to ensure the protection of the existing Karner blue butterfly habitat and open the door to its potential expansion.

Blanding's Update

The state-threatened Blanding's turtle had a good year in Wilton with the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation and area landowners keeping a watchful eye on nests that yielded numerous hatchlings. Blanding's turtles can live 70 to 80 years with sexual maturity reached at approximately 20 years.

Thanks to Wilton For New Office & Barn Space

The Town of Wilton acquired a 4-acre property adjacent to the Camp Saratoga property on Scout Road in 2005. It includes a single family residential structure and barn that the WWPP and Town of Wilton are upgrading for WWPP use. More specifically, the residential structure is being turned into office and meeting space and the barn is being upgraded for use as an equipment and supply storage facility. Senator Hugh

Farley awarded the WWPP a \$3,500 Aid-to-Locality grant to pay for the materials needed to upgrade the barn. WWPP held numerous "barn raising" volunteer workdays to ready the barn for use this winter. Town Councilman Larry Gordon has been overseeing the project and spending many hours on and off the site ensuring the job is well done. The Town of Wilton Highway Department, led by Kirk Woodcock, devoted a great deal of time improving drainage on the site. At this writing, WWPP is working with the State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation with hope of obtaining funds to assist with these projects.

Karner Blues News

Our habitat restoration work is showing success with butterflies! At an Old Gick Farm restoration site that was planted in 2003, the numbers of observed Karner blue butterflies increased from 10 in 2004 to 220 in 2005. With the addition of our tractor and Truax seed drill (purchased with local contributors' money and an Aid to Localities grant from Senator Farley), we're able to plant larger areas with greater consistency in less time.



In 2005 we planted fifteen acres with blue lupine and seeds associated with the Glacial Lake Albany seed mix. Nature Conservancy staff planted blue lupine

and little bluestem grass seeds using the tractor and seed drill. Volunteers planted seedlings at a number of sites and hand broadcast a seed mix containing



a variety of nectar species including butterfly milkweed, horsemint, New Jersey tea, roundheaded bush clover, and goats rue. These plantings occurred on protected lands along Route 50, Ballard Road, and Scout Road.
