Message from the Executive Director

Working on the annual report is always an enjoyable project. We can and do get caught up in our day-to-day tasks, and it is a welcome opportunity for introspection. It gives us a chance to look back on all of the accomplishments of the past year and to be reminded of the many good things that have happened. Planning for our 15th anniversary celebration gave us the same opportunity to look back on 15 years worth of accomplishments and it has really been a pleasure.

Starting with just an idea and an acre, the founders of the Wilton Wildlife Preserve & Park did something quite remarkable and we are the beneficiaries of that vision. Who would have thought that in the midst of the booming development of the Town of Wilton, that conservationists and government officials would come together, all for the love of a little blue butterfly!

This leap of faith and the establishment of a note-worthy public/private partnership has resulted in the creation of a unique and successful organization. We are proud of how well we are fulfilling our mission in conservation: with over 2,400 acres of protected lands owned by our partners; with the habitat restoration efforts in the Preserve & Park resulting in the largest population of Karner blue butterflies in the Northeast; and with the discovery that these Sandplains are home to many more rare and protection-worthy species than anyone ever imagined. Our work in the coming years will undoubtedly reveal even more.

While we are rooted in conservation, we are also a park for people and this is certainly reflected in our recreational and environmental education opportunities which are recognized as a region-wide asset. People from all over enjoy our year-round trail system and through programs on and off site we share our knowledge about the wonders of the natural world with our community.

If the first 15 years are any indication of what the future will bring, I think that we can all expect more great accomplishments and the resulting benefits for our community.

2011 Highlights in Conservation

Grassland Habitat Restoration at Camp Saratoga

The work to restore an area of approximately 15 acres at Camp Saratoga to oak/pine savannah continued. This will provide expanded habitat for the endangered Karner blue butterfly. Since wild blue lupine is a perennial and only begins to flower in its second year, this coming spring should see this new habitat in full bloom.



Wetland Research

In partnership with the Albany Pine Bush Commission, we helped to conduct research on the vernal pools that are found on many of the properties at the Preserve & Park. Data collected by our Education and Conservation interns and by our volunteers will be used to further the knowledge of these unique wetlands.

Frog, Toad and Salamander Surveys

The wet spring produced a bumper crop of amphibian sightings including the seldom-seen Spadefoot toad. It emerged in large numbers and was found in wetlands that we had not known it to occupy. With the help of local naturalist Kenny Barnett, these locations were mapped.



Seed collecting

Our interns and volunteers worked with interns from The Nature Conservancy and NYS DEC to do lupine and butterfly milkweed seed collection. It was a bumper crop of lupine seeds in 2011.

Monitoring Success

A twelve week intern from Skidmore College worked in tandem with NYS DEC's butterfly monitors to do the data collection for the population count of the Karner blue butterfly. This was funded by The Nature Conservancy.

Blanding's Turtle Research

The report of many years of research done on the threatened Blanding's turtle by Andrea Chaloux in partnership with Wilton Wildlife Preserve & Park, New York State Department of Environmental Conservation and Saratoga PLAN was completed. The strength of this research and the conservation recommendations will frame our conservation work for years to come.



Frawley Acquisition

The 68 new acres that were purchased with the help of a Saratoga County Open Space Grant were walked and carefully evaluated for the locations of the best sites for habitat restoration and trails. Look to 2012 for trail building to begin!

2011 Highlights in Environmental Education

Lupine Festival

On National Trails Day we initiated a new event to bring people into the Preserve & Park in the springtime when the wild blue lupine is in bloom and there would be the possibility of seeing a Karner blue butterfly. It was also the first day the fire tower opened to the public. Hundreds of people enjoyed exploring the trails and participating in the activities that were offered. The first brood of the Karner blue butterflies were out too!



Expanded Public Programs

To further our mission of environmental education, we added even more public programs on weekends and during school vacation times, almost doubling our program offerings over previous years.

Upgraded school programs

We reworked our in-school programs to add more hands-on activities and more connections to the New York State Science Syllabus.

Education and Conservation Interns

The Student Conservation Association continues to be a great resource for finding highly qualified interns. Adeline Brym, a graduate of Wittenberg College, completed her internship in June and helped to train our current intern, Shabana Hoosein, an Environmental Sciences graduate from Union College.



Wal-mart Grant

We received a \$25,000 grant from the Wal-mart Foundation State grant program to support our Conservation and Education Intern and to enhance our school and public programs.

2011 Highlights in Recreation

New Trail Connector at Camp Saratoga

With the help of a group of volunteers from the Milton Navy Base, we were able to clear an old trail to create a new connection between Camp Saratoga and the Opdahl Farm. This trail also includes a stream crossing. Saratoga County Soil and Water Conservation District helped our trail crew in removing and installing a new culvert.



Stryder Runs and 8k Snow Shoe Race

Our recreation program is greatly enhanced by our partnership with the Saratoga Stryders. They organize and run a great 5k fun run series in July and August. The 8k snowshoe race that they organize as part of the Dion race series attracted top snowshoe racers both locally and from around the northeast. They appreciate the great job that our trail groomer, Pieter Litchfield, does in keeping the trails in great shape for racing and recreational use.



Cornell Hill Fire Tower Opened at Camp Saratoga




